The new Roosevelt Middle School opened for the first time on Thursday, September 8th, 2016. It took about a year and a half to build this majestic school. It's slightly smaller than the old one but seems a lot more spacious.

Roosevelt Middle School: A history in three buildings.

In 1924 the Eugene school district built Roosevelt Junior High School (also known as Condon Elementary or Agate Hall) and Franklin Junior High School (also known as Lincoln Elementary and fortunately still stands as the Lincoln Elementary Condominiums) for a burgeoning population of boys and girls aged 13-16 years of age. Both schools opened in September 1925 and served 7, 8 and 9th grades. The combined enrollment at the schools was 725.

Broad course offerings became a part of the curriculum that year, too. Latin, algebra, science, world history and physical education were offered to all students. Each student was assigned to seven periods of classwork and one study hall. Emphasis was placed on high marks.

A complete revision of the Eugene school curriculum began in 1933 under Superintendent H.R. Goold who led a series of conferences to study common school problems. Each year, for five years, a different focus on curriculum was worked through until 1938 when the Central Curriculum program was formulated. By March 1939, the Scope and Sequence Chart was printed. This document became a landmark in curriculum development for Eugene. It defined the scope of the school programs, suggested units of work and outlined their grade level sequence. The new curriculum was in place fall 1939.


Both Eugene middle schools were filled to capacity by 1940. The closing of Santa Clara High School brought in more students and the population of Eugene grew during the war years. In 1944-45 Eugene consolidated with the districts of Dunn, Stella Magladry, River Road, Santa Clara, Willagillespie and Garden Way thus becoming the 4j school district.

A third middle school was needed. Colin Kelly (named for Colin P. Kelly Jr., a US Army Air Corps pilot killed in the Phillipines) opened January 1947.

A new Roosevelt middle school was completed in 1950 and planned by Wolff and Zimmer of Portland. Wolff and

Zimmer also planned Cal Young and Kelly Middle Schools.

The mid-century building was showing signs of age. It lacked space and technology functions for the contemporary learning environment and deemed energy inefficient. A bond measure passed in May 2013 passed to fix the situation. Designed by Mahlum Architects of Portland in association with Robertson Sherwood Architects of Eugene a new building was designed and completed over the summer. Built with the future in mind, the doors opened this last September ushering in a new chapter in the history of Roosevelt Middle School.

Having problems with a party next door?

To report a party or other non-emergency situation, call EPD at **(541) 682-5111**. It's very important that you tell the dispatcher that you are willing to sign a complaint and be sure to give the exact street address. Saying something like "the corner of 19th and Villard" is NOT sufficient.

Having the street number of the house or building enables the University of Oregon to follow up on complaints and track problems in the neighborhood.

If you are going to host a party, follow these simple steps:

- 1. Control the guest list.** Don't let random people who are walking around looking for a party into your house.
- 2. Adults only.** If you choose to

serve alcohol, ensure that you only serve to persons twenty-one or older.

- 3. Plan ahead.** Notify your neighbors in advance of the date, times, and location of the party, and a contact name and number in case problems arise.

- 4. Monitor noise levels.** Keep doors and windows closed.

- 5. Discourage drinking games.**

- 6. Clean up debris from your yard and the street.**

- 7. Prevent drunk driving.**

- 8. Safety first.** If you are concerned for a friend's medical safety, such as alcohol poisoning, call 911.

- 9. Cooperate with police.** If contacted by police or other authorities, be respectful and be compliant.

Unfortunately, there are a few not so good things about the new Roosevelt. One of the bad things about the new Roosevelt is that sometimes the automatic doors don't open fast enough when a big crowd is trying to get to their next classes. Also, you can't use the full gym when the bleachers are pulled out because the bleachers take up too much space. The bathrooms also have a few problems: sometimes the sinks won't turn on, won't turn off, or the

water pressure is super low.

The classrooms on the ground floor in Roosevelt can get really loud when the people move their chairs on the second floor. In the cafeteria, the tables have little seats on them not benches, so fewer people can fit at each table, so it's a little excluding. "I don't really like that in between classes the halls get really crowded. That will happen in every school, so I guess that's not very fixable" says Timmy Parsons, a 7th grader at Roosevelt.

Over all, the new school is pretty great and we are lucky to have such an amazing, nice and new school.
